Memorial Park

Edward River Council mayor Cr. Norm Brennan has said Council is delighted with the recent funding allocation by the NSW State Government of \$1,650,775.00 under the Crown Lands Showgrounds Stimulus Funding Program.

"We were thrilled to receive the news from the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment that our application for four new projects at Memorial Park had been successful," Cr. Brennan said.

"This is the second round of funding we have received from the NSW Government. The first resulted in the fantastic new fence, seating and a new car park.

"This second round will see new sealed access roads, more car parking, kerb and guttering, a new toilet block and facilities and an extension to the club rooms used by the Deniliquin Netball Association and the Cricket Club," he said.

"It is substantially more funding and much needed to upgrade our facilities there."

Cr. Brennan said this latest funding was made available from the NSW Government's Covid-19 Stimulus Package.

"We are grateful to the NSW Government and look forward to getting to work on the upgrades and new facilities as soon as possible," he said.



Tree Subsidy

Edward River Council's annual tree planting subsidy has commenced with over 50 varieties of plants available to eligible residents.

Aimed at increasing native vegetation in the Edward River Council region, local ratepayers on properties one hectare and over are welcome to apply.

"This year we have the support of Rice-growers Association, Local Land Services and Landcare NSW who have contributed \$1500 to the program," Mayor Norm Brennan said.

"Their support has allowed us to offer optional cardboard tree guards for just 30 cents each, rather than the normal 55 cents each."

Property owners of one to 500 hectares are welcome to apply for the subsidised seedlings at a cost of \$0.65 each from now until Friday 27 August 20201.

Mayor Brennan said the scheme was aimed at assisting local property owners to not only help landscape their homes but also to help the environment.
